Attracting Butterfies O'TOOLE'S

Butterflies are not only beautiful visitors to our gardens but great pollinators and important members of our eco-system. To attract butterflies to your garden you need to create a comfortable environment for the whole life cycle of a butterfly from caterpillar to adult. You'll need three basic elements; caterpillar food, butterfly food and a comfortable physical environment.

Caterpillar Food

Butterflies lay their eggs on plants that will become a food source for the growing caterpillars. Some caterpillars like to eat specific plants. For example, the monarch butterfly feed on milkweed plants and yellow swallowtails eat only parsley. Any damage caused by caterpillars is small and temporary. Many trees, perennials, herbs and vegetables make good caterpillar food

Butterfly Food

Butterflies drink nectar, the sweet liquid inside a flower. Butterflies are attracted to bright, fragrant flowers that give them enough room to sit on. In a sunny area, plant a variety of nectar rich flowers in close clumps to encourage adult butterflies to feed. Try to have a variety of different flowers with different blooming times to attract a wider variety of butterflies.

Comfortable Environment

Now that your butterfly visitors have food, they'll want a comfortable place to stay. Most butterflies like some protection from the wind in the form of trees, shrubs or grasses. These are also perfect spots for them to roost on cool, cloudy days. They also like open areas with lots of sun. Many adult male butterflies like to congregate near open, wet, sandy areas or puddles. Scientists don't know the exact reason for these "mud puddle clubs", but they think that the butterflies get important moisture and minerals from the water. A pile of rocks in a sheltered part of the garden also gives butterflies a place to warm up on sunny days.
